Sleeping St. Joseph

Have you ever heard of the devotion to "Sleeping St. Joseph"? The Gospel tells us that St. Joseph was going to divorce Mary quietly after he learned that she was pregnant. But an angel of the Lord appeared to St. Joseph in a dream, telling him to not be afraid, that Mary would give birth to the Savior: Jesus Christ. God was entrusting Joseph with His greatest treasures: Mary and the Baby Jesus. St. Joseph's faithfulness to God's will helped bring our Savior into the world. The image of St. Joseph as he's sleeping is a powerful reminder of his peaceful surrender to God's plan for his life.

Pope Francis has owned a Sleeping St. Joseph statue for several years, and brought it with him from Argentina to the Vatican when he became pope. He explained that whenever he has a problem or special prayer, he writes it down and places it underneath the Sleeping St. Joseph. St. Joseph takes care of the intention while the pope rests.

Catholics around the world have adopted this practice and bought their own Sleeping St. Joseph statues in order to ask St. Joseph for his intercession in the midst of life's difficulties.

We should always remember St. Joseph's whole-hearted "yes" to God's will, even when it wasn't what he himself had planned or imagined. St. Joseph exemplifies total submission to God in the midst of uncertainty. When we honour the Sleeping St. Joseph statue, we are trusting St. Joseph to intercede for us—and trusting that God will handle our problems while we rest.

Collette Kelly and Maureen Barr on their recent visit to Carfin Grotto, Scotland have brought back a sleeping St Joseph statue which will be displayed in Our Lady's Altar.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

27th June – St Cyril of Alexandria. Saint Cyril of Alexandria was patriarch of Alexandria in Egypt and an able theologian. As bishop and doctor, he became the glory of the church in Egypt. During the Council of Ephesus, he defined the oneness of person in Jesus Christ and the divine maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary against the heresy of Nestorius.

St John Southworth. Born in 1592 at Samlesbury Hall, near Preston. He was educated at Douai and returned to the English Mission as a priest in 1613. He worked mainly in Lancashire. He was caught in 1627 and imprisoned at Lancaster along with Edmund Arrowsmith to whom he gave the last rites on 28th August 1628. He was sent to the Clink in London but was released in 1630 and was banished abroad. In 1636 he returned to England. He was subsequently arrested four times and released three times by the secretary of state at the direction of the Queen, the fourth time he escaped. He was eventually captured in 1654 and executed at Tyburn. He was canonised in 1970 as one of the Forty Martyrs.

28th June - St Irenaeus. A bishop and martyr (c.130-200) was of Eastern origin, perhaps from Smyrna whose bishop Polycarp, disciple of John the Apostle, he had known as a boy. He studied at Rome and became a priest at Lyons; later becoming a bishop after the previous bishop was martyred. Irenaeus proved himself to be an important theologian. His significance, however, was only fully realized in the 20th century. Irenaeus strongly emphasized the importance of Tradition in the apostolic succession of the episcopate and in formation of the Canon of Scripture, where authority of the Four Gospels, completing each other, is supreme.

29th June - Ss Peter and Paul. It is a holy day of obligation in large parts of the Latin Church. On this feast, newly created metropolitan archbishops receive from the pope the primary symbol of their office, the pallium. (*Peter's Pence collection after each celebration of Mass.*)

30th June - First Martyrs of the See of Rome. The First Martyrs of the Church of Rome were Christians martyred in the city of Rome during Nero's persecution in 64. The event is recorded by both Tacitus and Pope Clement I, among others.

1st July - St Oliver Plunket. 1629-1681. Born in County Meath, Ireland, Oliver studied in Rome and was ordained in 1654. Consecrated Bishop of Armagh in 1669, he began the task of restoring the Church, laid waste by continuous persecution. Arrested on a sham charge of complicity, Irish judges refused to convict him of treason because he propagated the Catholic faith. He was brought to London and on his second trial was found guilty of treason with little evidence. He was executed at Tyburn in 1681, the last to be martyred in England. His body rests at Downside.
